core text that has models; there will be writing in class; there will be examples

used and presented in class; there will be discussion, in addition to some few lectures in class.

 Yes, and in addition to peer reviews for each assignment, instructors will also be grading these drafts

- Proper use of grammar
- Proper use of proper vocabulary of political science
- Proper use of citations
- Written in scientific tone
- Proper presentation style
