The following option from the College of Nursing is presented for your review and approval:

- The College of Nursing would like to offer the Accelerated Second Degree BSN Option. This is not a new degree, but rather a different option for earning the BSN from the College of Nursing. This option is designed for students who have earned a baccalaureate or higher degree and are interested in pursuing a BSN degree with eligibility to obtain licensure as a Registered Nurse (RN). This 12-month program will begin in the 2nd summer session annually. It will offer students access to a variety of educational and clinical experiences as well as expert nursing faculty and technological resources. At the completion of the course work, graduates will be eligible to sit for the National Council Licensure Examination for Registered Nurses (NCLEX-RN) and begin new careers in professional nursing. Upon completion of all required general education courses and designated nursing prerequisite courses, second degree students can complete the BSN option of study in 12 months. The rapid pace of this option demands a full-time commitment to academics.
- The College of Nursing will discontinue the Alternate Entry MSN option based on national trends. Many advanced practice programs require a BSN for admission. For example, the Doctor of Nursing Practice (DNP) program requires a minimum of a BSN degree. Many master's degree programs in nursing are converting to DNP programs.
- In order to accelerate this option of study, the course content is integrated to facilitate the rapid learning of the essential concepts.

Accelerated Second Degree Option

The Accelerated Second Degree BSN option is designed for students who have earned a baccalaureate or higher degree and are interested in pursuing a BSN degree with eligibility to obtaining licensure as a Registered Nurse (RN). This 12-month program will begin in the 2nd summer session annually. It will offer

students access to a variety of educational and clinical experiences as well as expert nursing faculty and technological resources. At the completion of the course work, graduates will be eligible to sit for the National Council Licensure Examination for Registered Nurses (NCLEX-RN) and begin new careers in professional nursing.

Upon completion of all required prerequisite courses, credits and designated nursing courses, second degree students can complete the BSN program of study in 12 months. The rapid pace of this option demands a full-time commitment to academics.

Application Process

To be eligible to apply for this option the applicant must have:

- A Bachelor's degree from an accredited college or university with a graduating cumulative GPA of 3.0 or better
- At least a B (3.0) in each of the specified mathematics, biology, and chemistry courses.
- A "C" (2.0) in the other prerequisite courses.
- Completed the National League for Nursing Pre-admission Examination (NLN PAX). Students achieving a composite score of 120 or higher and 50th percentile in each subtest area will be given preference.

Admission to this option is competitive. Applicants meeting the minimum requirements are not guaranteed admission to the option. Admissions are once a year with classes beginning in the second summer session. Applications must be filed by December 1st for the next year's admission. The National League for Nursing Pre-admission Examination (NLN PAX) must be taken as part of the application process. Students achieving a composite score of 120 or higher and 50th percentile in each subtest area will be given preference. The GAP, NLN PAX test score, and a completed application will be used to determine a pool of candidates selected for interview.

Special Requirements

All nursing students must maintain American Heart Association BLS Healthcare Provider certification in CPR.

Nursing students must meet certain mandatory requirements including drug screening, a cleared criminal background check, proof of health insurance coverage, and immunizations. Specific information will be provided once the offer of admission to the nursing program has been accepted.

Program of Study

The BSN degree requires at least 128 credits: 40 credits in nursing, and 88 credits transferred from the previous baccalaureate degree including the designated prerequisites. Science course work cannot be more than five years old.
