## I. INTRODUCTION

The *Campus Living Contract*, referred to as Contract in this document, is to be used by students requesting Campus Housing and Dining. All of the materials contained herein are an integral and binding part of this Contract. It is the student's responsibility to become familiar with all provisions of this Contract. This Contract encompasses the academic year beginning August 18, 2007, and ending May 9, 2008. Please return this signed Contract, the required Application Fee and Advance Room Fee. **Please print legibly. Do not detach sections of the Contract; it must be submitted in its entirety.** Incomplete, or contracts submitted without payment (\$100 application fee and \$100 advance room fee) will not be processed for an assignment. No terms or condition of this *Campus Living Contract* can be waived, and no statement made by East Carolina University Campus Living or their agents is considered a waiver of any term or condition. The terms and conditions of this Contract also apply to prospective resident students during their attendance at any orientation session while staying in Campus Housing. The terms and conditions of this Contract are not intended to provide general or specific residence hall policies, which can be found in our *Residents' Handbook* on the East Carolina University Web site at [www.ecu.edu/campusliving](http://www.ecu.edu/campusliving).

## V. PAYMENTS

- A. The student understands that this Contract is for space in the residence halls and not for a specific room or building.
- B. The student agrees to pay the university a one-time, nonrefundable \$100 Application Fee and a \$100 Advance Room Fee for this Contract period of the 2007-2008 academic year. The \$100 Advance Room Fee will be credited to the student's account for the Spring Semester Room Fee. **Both the \$100 Application Fee and a \$100 Advance Room Fee (total \$200) must be submitted at (or before) the time of application.**

C. The student understands that the room payment as established by the university must be paid on or before the scheduled cancellation day of each semester, which is August 15, 2007, by 4:00 p.m. and January 4, 2008, by 4:00 p.m. Failure to pay does not constitute Contract cancellation. The housing and dining rates for 2007–2008 Academic Year and the Application Fee will be the rate determined by the East Carolina University Board of Trustees at the 2007 spring meeting.

D. Make checks payable to East Carolina University.

## VI. GENERAL TERMS AND CONDITIONS

### A. Purpose

The premises will be used by the student solely for residential and educational purposes while enrolled at East Carolina University.

### B. Assignments

Space in Campus Housing will be reserved for the student for the entire academic year.

The university may alter the specific room assignment, if necessary, during the assignment process. The university reserves the right to make room assignments, to authorize or deny room and roommate changes, to consolidate vacancies, and to require a student to move from one room or residence hall to another.

If a student is assigned a space after the start of classes, the room charges will be prorated for the balance of the Contract period.

Assignments will normally be made on the basis of two students per room in the residence halls. However, demand for housing may require that the university assign three persons per room and, thus, the university reserves the right to assign students in this manner. Students also may be assigned to temporary space. Students so assigned will be reassigned to double occupancy spaces as they become available. Students still assigned to triple occupancy or temporary housing after the first day of the fourth week of classes will receive a prorated credit toward the next semester's charges. Students who are offered to be reassigned will only receive a prorated credit until the day the reassignment is offered.

If space is available, students may request retention of a room as a single accommodation at the prevailing single rate upon approval by the director of Campus Living. The additional single rate is prorated for late room assignments or early withdrawal.

Rooms in the residential facilities are to be occupied only by the students assigned to them. A student's right to occupy a room in the residential facilities pursuant to this may not be assigned or transferred by the student.

Room assignments may be changed only upon written authorization from Campus Living and after the students involved have made a serious attempt to adjust to the situation. No changes of room assignments will normally be made until the seventh class day of each semester.

Students who make an unauthorized room change may be required to return to the original assignment, denied the opportunity to participate in any other room change, and assessed \$100 for an unauthorized room change.

It is the policy of the university to assign roommates without regard to race, color, national origin, religion, sexual orientation, age, or disability. Students of the opposite sex will not be assigned to, nor may they reside in, the same room.

### C. Consolidation and Roommates

Students assigned to a room and not contracted for single occupancy and having no roommate must at all times occupy their side of the room only, maintaining the other side of the room for roommate occupancy at any time. The university may consolidate rooms to full capacity when vacancies occur and may move students to another room when such consolidation becomes necessary. Any room change must be approved and completed within five days after notification to consolidate. If the consolidation has not occurred within this five-day period, the student will automatically be charged and legally obligated to pay the additional single room rate.

### D. Campus Dining Meal Plan and Card Policy

All students in student housing under this contract are required to participate in a Campus Dining meal plan. All first-year residence hall students must choose a 19 Pirate Plus, a 14 Pirate Plus, a 9 Pirate Plus, The Pirate 19, The Pirate 14, or The Pirate 9 meal plan. Returning students and transfer students must choose a 19 Pirate Plus, a 14 Pirate Plus, a 9 Pirate Plus, The Pirate 19, The Pirate 14, The Pirate 9, or the \$400 Pirate Bucks plan. If a student does not specify a meal plan on this Contract, the student will automatically be assigned The Pirate 14 meal plan. A new allotment of meals is provided for the student every Monday throughout the academic year. Any of the allotted meals a student does not use by the close of business every Sunday throughout the academic year will be forfeited.

For all first-year students and students selecting the \$400 Pirate Bucks account, the initial Pirate Bucks Account funds provided with the Pirate 19, 14, and 9 must be spent by the end of the semester. Any amount of the initial Pirate Bucks account funds left in the account at the end of the semester will be forfeited. For all first-year students with the 19, 14, and 9 Pirate Plus plans, only half of the initial Pirate Bucks account funds provided must be spent by the end of the semester. With the Pirate Plus plans, only half of your Pirate Bucks account funds will carry over to the next semester if not used. Any additional Pirate Bucks funds that are added during the semester will carry over to the end of the semester.

### E. Cancellation Policy

All requests for cancellation of the Campus Living Contract must be submitted in writing to Campus Living, Jones Hall Office Suite 100, Greenville, NC 27858 and are subject to the following terms and conditions:

#### *Campus Housing*

- A. Cancellation of this Contract prior to May 31, 2007, will result in no forfeiture plus a refund of the \$100 Advance Room Fee.
- B. Cancellation of this Contract after May 31, 2007, through June 30, 2007 will require the forfeiture of \$75 of the \$100 Advance Room Fee.
- C. Cancellation of this Contract between July 1, 2007, and July 31, 2007, will require the forfeiture of all of the \$100 Advance Room Fee.
- D. After July 31, 2007, cancellation of this Contract will require a payment of fifty percent (50 percent) of the remaining balance due under the Contract plus a prorated amount of the room rate for the time the room was occupied. A student may petition the Campus Living Appeals Committee (CLAC) for an exception to this fee structure on the grounds of financial exigency or family or medical emergency. If a student is approved for an exception to the normal cancellation fee structure by the CLAC, he/she will be required to pay a cancellation fee of \$400, plus the prorated amount of the room rate for the time the room was occupied. The decision of the CLAC is final.

#### *Campus Dining*

- A. Changes of meal plans are initiated only in the Campus Dining office located in Jones Residence Hall. Students may cancel their meal plan only if they buy out of the housing portion of the Campus Living Contract or are approved by the appeals committee to cancel their contract. **Students who cancel or buy out of their Campus Living Contract after July 31, 2007, for any reason or are evicted from Campus Housing will require a \$150 buyout fee for canceling their Campus Meal Plan in addition to any charges from the Campus Housing portion of the contract.**
- B. Meal plans are refundable on a prorated basis less any Pirate Bucks funds used less any fees or charges.
- C. Students may make changes to their fall semester meal plans until the Friday after Labor Day. There is a \$25 service charge for changing to a smaller meal plan when a refund is requested; however, a total value rollover to a smaller plan will incur no service charges.
- D. Students may make changes to their spring semester meal plans until the Friday after Martin Luther King Jr. Holiday. There is a \$25 service charge for changing to a smaller meal plan when a refund is requested; however, a total value rollover to a smaller plan will incur no service charges.

### F. Evictions

A student who is evicted from Campus Housing for Contract or Code of Conduct violations is liable for room fees prorated to the date of removal from Campus Housing. In addition, the student forfeits the Advance Room Fee of \$100 and will be responsible for the cost of the remainder of the contract not to exceed \$400. A student may be evicted (a) for failure to abide by the terms of occupancy described in this Contract; (b) for disciplinary reasons; (c) for criminal conviction(s); (d) for actions indicating behavior(s) that could pose a risk to person or property and/or could be injurious or disruptive to the residence hall community or the living-learning environment; (e) for university withdrawal (1) for scholastic reasons or (2) for medical reason(s).

### G. Official Withdrawal Policy and Refunds

Any campus resident student officially withdrawing from the university must also withdraw from Campus Living by completing a Resident Contract Cancellation Request, available at the Neighborhood Services Offices. Students who are also withdrawing from East Carolina University must likewise complete the application for withdrawal, available from the Office of the Registrar. Once the university withdraw is complete, room refunds are based upon the date a student's belongings are removed, the student's keys are surrendered, and the Campus Living Resident Contract Cancellation Request is completed. Room refunds are calculated on a daily prorating of charges exclusive of those days during final examination periods.

### H. Construction and Renovation

Construction and/or remodeling or repair of academic and residential buildings on the East Carolina University campus in the vicinity of the residence halls is scheduled

for the 2007–2008 academic year. Construction is expected to occur during normal daytime hours and will result in disturbances and disruptions including, but not limited to, increased noise and dust in the areas around the residence halls and both planned and unplanned utility shutdowns in the residence halls. By signing this Contract, the student agrees that he or she has been advised of said scheduled construction and acknowledged that there will be disturbances and disruptions resulting from such construction and has agreed to such.

#### **I. Termination by the University**

The university may terminate this Contract (a) for nonpayment; (b) for eviction of a student from Campus Housing; (c) for all students and any prospective resident student who violates the Zero Tolerance Policy or any other serious violation during any orientation session, while staying in Campus Housing or (d) when a student officially withdraws from enrollment at East Carolina University.

The university reserves the right to determine that past and current behavior and/or criminal record of any student is such that the best interests of the university and/or the student him/herself, and/or other students, would best be served by cancellation of this Contract. If the university becomes aware that a student has a record of criminal conviction(s) or other actions indicating behavior(s) that could pose a risk to person or property and/or could be injurious or disruptive to the residence hall community or the living-learning environment, the university may terminate this Contract.

If a student is admitted to the hospital for psychological reasons, an East Carolina University counselor must evaluate that student before the student is allowed to return to his or her residence hall living space. The Center for Counseling and Student Development is entitled to contact the director for residence life regarding the student's disposition.

In the event that the accommodations assigned to the student are destroyed or otherwise made unavailable and the university does not furnish other accommodations, all rights of the student and liabilities of the university shall cease, and rental payments made previously by the student shall be refunded on a prorated basis for the period for which accommodations were not made available to the student.

#### **J. Late Arrival**

Unless a student requests, in writing, an extension of the arrival period through Campus Living, East Carolina University is not obligated to hold a space reservation past noon on the first day of class. If a student fails to check in prior to noon of the first day of class and appears subsequently, assignment elsewhere will be made if space is available. Failure to check in and sign for room keys does not constitute Contract cancellation.

#### **K. Room Condition**

Upon termination of this Contract, the student must leave the assigned room, its furnishings, and its equipment in as good an order and condition as the same were upon commencement of the student's occupancy, ordinary wear and tear excepted. In addition to the check by the student staff, maintenance staff will check the room for cleaning/damages, charges for which will be assessed to the responsible individuals. Personal property left in a room following the termination of occupancy will be deemed abandoned. Students may be charged for the removal of such property.

#### **L. Alterations**

No alterations or repairs may be made to the assigned room, its furnishings, or its equipment without the express written consent of the university. Stacking of furniture not specifically designed to be stacked is prohibited. University furniture must remain in the room and may not be placed in storage.

#### **M. Damages**

The university will assess damage charges for unauthorized use of and alterations to rooms, furnishings, equipment, and buildings, and for special cleaning necessitated by improper care of rooms and equipment. Charges may also be made for damages and excessive cleaning to public areas. All residents of a corridor, section, or hall will be held accountable for equal portions of the total damage/excessive cleaning charges. Cleaning and damage charges will be billed to the student.

#### **N. Campus Housing and Dining Opening and Closing Dates**

All halls except those designated as academic-year halls by the director of Campus Living are closed during official university vacation periods, and students must vacate the premises. The meal portion of the meal plans follow the residence halls opening and closing calendar. Pirate Bucks funds are always valid for use. Campus Housing and Dining opening and closing dates are as follows:

##### **Opening for Move-in**

Residence halls open at 9:00 a.m., Saturday, August 18, 2007.  
Campus dining halls open for dinner, Thursday, August 16, 2007.

##### **Thanksgiving Break**

Non-academic-year halls close at 10:00 a.m., Wednesday, November 21, 2007.  
Campus dining halls close after dinner, Tuesday, November 20, 2007.  
Non-academic-year halls open at 1:00 p.m., Sunday, November 25, 2007.  
Campus dining halls open for dinner, Sunday, November 25, 2007.

##### **Semester Break**

Non-academic-year halls close at 10:00 a.m., Saturday, December 15, 2007.  
Campus dining halls close after dinner, Friday, December 14, 2007.  
Non-academic-year halls open at 1:00 p.m., Tuesday, January 8, 2008.  
Campus dining halls open for lunch, Wednesday, January 9, 2008.

##### **Spring Break**

Non-academic-year halls close at 10:00 a.m., Saturday, March 8, 2008.  
Campus dining halls close after dinner, Friday, March 7, 2008.  
Non-academic-year halls open at 1:00 p.m., Sunday, March 16, 2008.  
Campus dining halls open for dinner, Sunday, March 16, 2008.

##### **Closing for End of Year**

All residence halls close at 10:00 a.m., Friday, May 9, 2008.  
Campus dining halls close after dinner, Thursday, May 8, 2008.

Students must vacate the residence halls within twenty-four hours of the completion of their last scheduled exams or by the official closing date and time stated above, whichever is earliest. Failure to do so will result a charge of a \$25 daily room rate.

#### **O. University's Right to Entry**

The university reserves the right (a) to enter any room for the purpose of inspection, maintenance, or repair; (b) to enter any room without notice to or permission of the resident thereof for the purpose of (1) inspecting for illegal drugs or narcotics as these terms are used in North Carolina statutes and (2) inspecting for firearms, fireworks, explosives, weapons, or any other substances, materials, or goods, the possession of which is a breach of this Contract, of the standards and regulations of the university, or the laws of the state of North Carolina; or (c) to enter any room when there is reason to believe that the occupants of the room are in serious physical or psychological distress. Such entry and inspection, however, should be made only when the university has reasonable cause to believe that such items or circumstances exist in the room.

#### **P. Prohibited Items**

The following items are not permitted to be used or stored in student rooms or any other area of housing: any internal combustion engine, acids, automobile batteries, gasoline, firearms or other weapons, fireworks, torchiere halogen lamps, and water beds or other water-filled furniture. Due to health standards and possible inconvenience to other residents, no birds, pets, or other animals, except for guide dogs for visually impaired residents and freshwater fish, are to be housed or kept in the residential facilities. A list of additional prohibited items is available in the online *Residents' Handbook*.

#### **Q. Enforcement Costs**

Should the university incur any expenses in the enforcement of any terms of this Contract, the student resident shall pay the costs of such enforcement including, but not limited to, reasonable attorney fees or collection fees.

#### **R. Commercial Enterprise**

Personal business enterprises shall not be conducted in or from Campus Housing.

#### **S. University Liability**

The university does not assume any obligation or liability for loss or damage to items of personal property that may occur in its buildings or on its grounds, prior to, during, or subsequent to the terms of this Contract. This includes, but is not limited to, damage, loss, fire, water damage, theft, and flooding. Students are urged to purchase renter's insurance for protection against loss or property damage. No interruption of utility services, heating, or cooling shall be deemed as an eviction or disturbance of students' use of the facilities or render the university liable for damages unless the university willfully refused to supply said services without cause or excuse.

#### **T. Student Responsibility**

The student is individually responsible for the proper care of the student's assigned room and its furnishings and equipment, and is jointly responsible with other students in the suite, on the floor, or in the residential facility for the proper care of common areas, furnishings, and equipment. Students are required to report maintenance concerns in their assigned room in a timely manner to prevent damage to the room or other student's property.

#### **U. Key Responsibility**

The student is responsible for all keys issued by Campus Living. Should any keys be lost, the student must report the loss to his/her Neighborhood Service Office, and the student

will be responsible for the key replacement and lock change fee of \$150. If the student requests loaner keys from the NSO at any time, the keys must be returned within twenty-four hours or the student is responsible for the \$150 key replacement/lock change fee. Immediately upon checkout, the student must return his/her keys to the NSO. Failure to do so will result in \$150 key replacement/lock change fee, in addition to a \$25 improper checkout fee.

#### V. Eligibility

To be eligible for Campus Housing, the student must be registered and enrolled at East Carolina University and must be paying tuition or be receiving some type of tuition reimbursement.

### VII. UNIVERSITY REGULATIONS AND GOVERNMENT STATUTES

#### A. Standards of Conduct

All students and prospective resident students attending any university orientation session housed in Campus Housing are required to abide by standards of conduct publicized by East Carolina University in the online *Residents' Handbook* and the online *Student Handbook* on the university Web sites at [www.ecu.edu/campusliving](http://www.ecu.edu/campusliving) for the *Residents' Handbook* and [www.ecu.edu/studenthandbook](http://www.ecu.edu/studenthandbook) for the *Student Handbook*, respectively.

Violations that compromise the safety and security of residents may result in eviction and Contract termination and/or other appropriate disciplinary sanctions. Such violations include, but are not limited to, the following:

1. Propping open building or suite doors and/or windows or jamming doors; allowing individuals into the building who are not residents of the building; opening secured outside entrance doors, including suite doors, and/or windows of a residence hall to allow unauthorized access.
2. Delivering, surrendering, or otherwise relinquishing possession of the room, curfew door, or mailbox key(s) to any individual, or permitting the key(s) to be duplicated or modified.
3. Accepting or possessing another resident's issued keys is also a violation.
4. Possessing or using weapons such as, but not limited to, firearms, fireworks, explosives, knives, bows and arrows, or martial arts equipment.
5. Endangering, injuring, or assaulting a staff member under circumstances related to the staff member's job function.
6. Tampering, alarming, discharging, disconnecting, or dismantling the fire safety equipment, including, but not limited to, fire extinguishers, pull stations, fire hoses, heat detectors, or smoke detectors.
7. Starting fires in the residence halls.
8. Using, manufacturing, storing, or selling illegal drugs and/or drug paraphernalia.

Violators of the standards of conduct found in the online *Residents' Handbook* or the Student Code of Conduct on the university Web site will be prosecuted in accordance with procedures contained in these publications and as approved by the appropriate authority. Upon the resident student's or prospective resident student's violation of the standards of conduct, the University at its option may terminate this Contract by giving notice to the resident student or prospective student of such termination and eviction.

#### B. Zero Tolerance Policy

Any resident student found responsible for violating either the Campus Living Contract and/or the Student Code of Conduct by illegally using, possessing, distributing, selling, and/or manufacturing an illegal or counterfeit drug or devices used to ingest, distribute, sell and/or manufacture an illegal or counterfeit drug within the residence and dining halls should expect to have his/her *Campus Living Contract* cancelled immediately and be held accountable under the Code of Conduct. A resident student whose Contract is cancelled will be required to move out of his/her residence hall and forfeit all keys within twenty-four hours of being notified of the outcome of his/her final appeal.

Campus Living reserves the right to relocate the resident student during the appeal process and ban him/her from all halls except the one to which he/she has been relocated. Depending upon availability, temporary housing may be offered. All ECU students have an obligation to report any suspicious activity, including drug-related situations, to his/her resident advisor, hall coordinator, and/or the ECU Police Department.

#### C. Family Educational Rights and Privacy Act

Please be advised that Campus Living may release personally identifiable information from the resident's educational record (which could include information regarding a disciplinary action taken against the resident) without the resident's consent by invoking the health and safety emergencies exception to the Family Educational Rights and Privacy Act ("FERPA"). This release will only be made when it is deemed, by the director for Campus Living's discretion, to be "necessary to protect the health or safety of the student or other individuals."

#### D. Equal Opportunity/Affirmative Action

East Carolina University is committed to equality of educational opportunity and does not discriminate against applicants, students, or employees based on race, color, national origin, religion, gender, age, sexual orientation, or disability. ECU is an equal opportunity/affirmative action university, which accommodates the needs of individuals with disabilities.

### VIII. SIGNATURES

You must complete, sign, and return the *Campus Living Contract* in its entirety, along with the one time, nonrefundable, **\$100 Application Fee and \$100 Advance Room Fee**, to reserve a space in the residence halls. The \$100 Advance Room Fee will be applied to the Spring 2008 housing fee.

*Please note:* Read all sections of the Contract before signing. The *Campus Living Contract* is a legally binding Contract that is in effect for the entire academic year. Submitting this signed *Campus Living Contract*, Application Fee, and Advance Room Fee obligates the student to reside in Campus Housing and requires all students participate in a meal plan for the duration of the Contract.

*It is not the policy of East Carolina University Campus Living to determine or direct the lifestyle of any student resident. It is, however, the policy of Campus Living to enforce the Zero Tolerance Policy when it comes to any illegal drug activity in any residence hall or dining facility. If your lifestyle is not conducive to this policy, your consideration for living elsewhere is advised.*
