

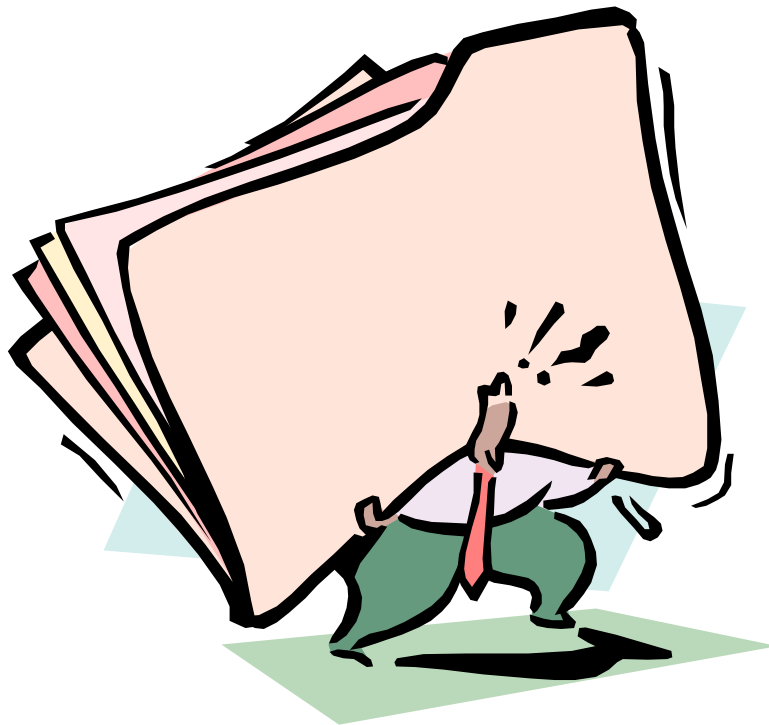
Using This Directory

This directory lists the more than 290 student clubs and organizations which registered during the 2003-2004 academic year. Those organizations are listed alphabetically by category. Each category represents an academic discipline or general grouping which most closely represents the organizations.

Please realize that as students change, so do student organizations. Groups may exist one year and be inactive the following year, only to resurface again. Not all of the groups which registered last year will choose to continue operations for the 2004-2005 year. As we have no way of knowing which groups might become inactive, all groups which registered in 2003-2004 are listed in the directory.

Should you be interested in receiving more information regarding any of the organizations included in the directory, simply fill out an interest card at the Student Leadership Development Programs Office and the card will be placed in the organization's mailbox. If you still do not get a response, you can request a contact phone number for the organization. Again, please realize that, as these are student organizations, busy class schedules and extracurricular demands may delay responses.

WHO?

WHAT?

East Carolina University has more than 290 student organizations with which you can become involved. Organizations include fraternities and sororities; club sports; religious, artistic and service groups; and academic related programs. There is something for everyone.

WHEN?

Start out on the right foot by getting involved in an organization. You will meet people who could become lifelong friends, and begin preparing for life after college. Don't get caught in your senior year with nothing to fill out your résumé.

WHERE?

Stop by the Student Leadership Development Programs Office, 109 Mendenhall Student Center and we can help get you started on a successful path of involvement at ECU. The visit will be well worth your time.

HOW?

Getting involved is easy! Just fill out a Student Organization Interest Card for each organization in which you are interested and turn them in to Student Leadership Development Programs, 109 Mendenhall Student Center. The card is even designed to serve as a postcard which you can drop in the mail. We will pass the cards you return on to the organizations which you have indicated. Then, sit back and wait to hear from the groups. It's that easy! Once you receive the information you can make an informed choice about which group seems right for you. WHY?

Take a look at the résumé of any successful professional and odds are it will show a history of involvement dating back to their college days. Being involved helps you develop the leadership and social skills, which employers seek out. Being involved also helps you meet new friends, enjoy your college experience, and feel like a part of ECU. Be a part from the start!

Finding the Group That's Right for You

As a student at East Carolina University, you will have opportunities to attend parties, games, lectures, service projects and special interest events as part of recruitment efforts by our student organizations. Social life and good friends are an important part of a successful college experience, and many worthwhile groups offer fun, involvement, acceptance by peers, self improvement, and the opportunity to make a positive difference.

The decision regarding with whom you choose to associate, as well as the types of activities in which you choose to participate, is yours. However, you need to be aware that some groups and individuals may have an agenda of their own in which your personal needs and desires play no part.

Positive groups state their mission and goals up front, and the subsequent activities and involvement they offer are consistent with the stated mission and goals. Be aware that some unethical groups may exist, and be wary of any group that recruits or retains members using pressure or control techniques.

Some Characteristics of UNETHICAL GROUPS

- “Instant” and overwhelming acceptance, encouragement and support which within a short period of time, becomes conditional.
- Your commitment to course work, studying and time spent with others who are not group members (including your family) is devalued. You are encouraged to place group activities and responsibilities ahead of these things.
- A philosophy which teaches that this group is flawless, that members are superior to other students and/or to members of similar groups.
- Certain activities about which no specific information (such as the location, length of time, etc.) is given and at which you may turn out to be the ONLY new member present; once there, your ability to take a break, eat, or even leave may be determined by the leaders.
- Your individual worth and personal beliefs are placed under attack; you are encouraged to “confess” faults, secrets, or fears. Furthermore, you are considered weak, unworthy or guilty if you express doubts, have questions, fail to follow instructions or do not achieve certain tasks.

If You Suspect a Group is Unethical

Spend some time learning about the group. Check with Student Leadership Development Programs to see if this group is known within the university community and is properly registered. Ask for a copy of the group's written goals and any other information they can give you.

If you feel uneasy about an invitation to participate in something, ask to bring someone else with you and ask more specific questions about the event. If the answers you get don't satisfy you, consider that this group may not be right for you.

Don't hesitate to be assertive -- if you are not interested in a specific group, say "NO". Be very clear and consistent with your message; you can be polite and still be understood. Hesitating or putting someone off until "next time" will only encourage continued unwanted recruitment efforts.

When You are Most Vulnerable to Unethical Recruitment

- When you are new to campus and have not yet formed many friendships
- When you are lonely, homesick, depressed or disappointed
- When a personal relationship has ended or a family crisis has occurred
- During times of stress such as final examination periods, the graduation semester, etc.
- During periods of financial pressure or employment uncertainty

Six EASY Steps to Positive Involvement

The great majority of our student organizations are constructive and well-meaning, whether they are academic, political, social, service, religious, or athletic in nature. In order to find the group that is best for you, there are some basic steps you can follow.

- Begin with what **INTERESTS** you
- Use the **RESOURCES** available to you:
 - Organization Directory
 - Student Leadership Development Programs
 - Friends, upperclassmen, faculty, and staff
- Make **CONTACT** with the groups in which you are interested
- **DISCOVER** the 5 Ws:
 - Who - Who are the other members of the group?
 - What - What types of activities and events does the group sponsor?

- Why - Why was the group formed and why should you join?
 When - When do they meet and when is their next function?
 Where - Where can you go for more information and where do they meet?

- **ATTEND** a function or meeting
- If it seems right for you, **JOIN!** If not, try another organization!

Registration of Student Organizations

All ECU student organizations must register with the University and must adhere to University polices and procedures. Registration of each student organization results in several privileges afforded to the group. These include the ability to reserve campus facilities, to potentially be granted funding from the Student Government Association, and to use the University name. Failure to register may result in loss of organization privileges.

All student organizations must register with the Office of Student Leadership Development Programs

- A. Each organization should support the mission of the university.
- B. Currently registered East Carolina University students must comprise the majority (fifty percent plus one) of all organization memberships. Organizations in which faculty are accepted as officers are excluded from the percentage requirement.
- C. Registration is a charter to exist, and only registered organizations may be granted permission to hold meetings or sponsor events on University property and/or facilities. Recognition from Student Government Association may be received only after the organization registers with the Office of Student Leadership Development Programs.
- D. Registration in no way implies University endorsement, sponsorship, or approval of an organization's activities or events.
- E. In order to register, a student organization must provide the following information to the Office of Student Leadership Development Programs on the appropriate Student Organization Online Registration Form on www.at.ecu.edu by **September 10, 2004**. (New organizations may register at any time.)
 1. Name of registering organization, as listed in its constitution and by-laws.
 2. Date Founded
 3. Federal ID #
 4. Website Address
 5. Statement of purpose, submitted with the constitution and/or by-laws. Any time the purpose of the organization changes, the organization must register again with the University through these procedures.
 6. Name, Address, Telephone, & Email Address of President
 7. Number of Active Members

8. Statement affirming open membership to all students. A statement in the constitution and by-laws which states that there shall be no discrimination of race, religion, creed, color, national origin, sex, age, sexual preference, veteran status, or disability with regards to the purpose of the club. (Social Greek organizations are exempt according to *Title IX*)
 9. Faculty or staff adviser name, campus address, campus phone number, and email address. The organization must have an ECU faculty or staff adviser. Off-campus advisers and graduate students are not permitted.
 10. The most recent constitution and/or by-laws.
- E. To be eligible for any officer position of leadership or responsibility in any registered student organization, publication, media or activity on campus a student must
1. Be currently enrolled in classes at East Carolina University
 2. Be in good social and academic standing with the University

Responsibilities of Student Organizations

Registered student organizations are expected to comply with the policies and procedural guidelines of the University outlined in *The Use of Facilities Reference Manual*, the *Student Handbook*, and any other university documents pertaining to student organizations. Review the online Student Handbook at www.ecu.edu/studenthandbook/.

Organizations are responsible for submitting any change in information previously provided on the Student Organization Registration Form to the Office of Student Leadership Development Programs within one month of the change. You may do so by emailing the information to leadership@mail.ecu.edu.

If student or group conduct comes to the attention of anyone in the University community indicating a possible violation of the Campus Codes of Conduct, the matter may be referred to the SGA attorney general for investigation and adjudication. Registered status may be removed by action of the campus judicial system.

What You Need to Get Involved in a Student Organization

- Personal Commitment
- Time – This is often the biggest obstacle that prevents students from getting involved. Some effective time management skills, advice from other students and creative problem – solving will help.
- Self – Motivation
- Courage to try new things and meet new people.

STUDENT LEADERSHIP DEVELOPMENT PROGRAMS

PROGRAMS

Walter and Marie Williams Leadership Awards Program

Up to twenty students are selected from Eastern North Carolina to receive a \$1,000 scholarship and to participate in a year-long leadership education experience which makes use of experiential education and community service. Topics of the program include ethics and values, and decision-making.

Harold H. Bate Citizenship Award

Five \$1500 one-year scholarship awards are given to the outstanding student in each high school in Craven, Jones, and Pamlico counties. Each student will participate in a year-long program in conjunction with the Walter and Marie Williams Leadership Awards program

Emerging Leaders Program

The Emerging Leaders Program is a non-credit course designed to help first-year students develop their skills in the areas of communication, goal-setting, and time management. This program provides opportunities for students to become involved, meet established leaders, recognize their leadership potential, and have fun while enhancing their leadership abilities.

Advanced Leadership Program

Available to sophomores and juniors, this professional preparation program concentrates on the topics of ethics, image management, and professionalism. Students must be nominated by a faculty or staff member.

Get A Clue

Scheduled for Wednesday, September 15 from 10:30 a.m. to 1:00 p.m. on Wright Plaza (rain date is September 22), this event highlights Division of Student Life services and student organizations. Students can “shop” numerous tables of information and groups in which they can become involved, and win prizes. This program is sponsored by the Division of Student Life.

Student Involvement Awards for Excellence

This annual awards program recognizes the accomplishments of student organizations and the students and advisers who lead them.

Leadership Corps

This student organization, made up of students who have completed either the Emerging Leaders Program or the Chancellor's Leadership Program, serves as peer leadership educators for the campus and surrounding community. Students train in the skills of leadership education and present activity-based leadership workshops to organizations which request them.

Seniors Elite: Established Leaders Inquiring about Tools for Enhancement

Seniors ELITE is a non-credit, informative program specifically formatted to assist senior-year students in the transition from college to life after graduation. The program is designed to facilitate an elevated understanding of how best to conclude your undergraduate career, while enhancing your already existent skills and cultivating new leadership qualities that will help you succeed beyond your undergraduate experience. Students may register between May and August of each year in 109 MSC.

Omicron Delta Kappa

Student Leadership Development Programs serves as the home office to the East Carolina University Circle of Omicron Delta Kappa, the National Leadership Honor Society, and provides assistance with many of their programs. Inquiries regarding Omicron Delta Kappa can be directed to this office.

SERVICES

Student Organization Registration

Attention all organizations! You must register with SLDP every year to be recognized as a student organization on campus. SLDP keeps on file all registrations and constitutions and lets interested students know about your organization. Registration Deadline is **September 10, 2004**.

Constitution Revision

Does your organization's constitution need a face-lift? Is the information outdated or inaccurate? SLDP can help you spruce up this document for your organization. Sample constitutions are also available for your use.

Organization Mailboxes

Each registered student organization is given a mailbox in 109 Mendenhall Student Center. This gives your organization a permanent address even when your officers change. Be sure to check your organization's mailbox regularly for important information.

Student Organization Interest Cards

During Summer Orientation new students can complete an interest card which will be forwarded to the organization(s) of their choice. This is a great way for new students to get more information about clubs and organizations.

Student Leader Consultation

SLDP can help you handle your organization effectively. We consult with leaders facing challenges or problems, and help leaders develop and present successful programs, organize group retreats, and develop team-building sessions.

Leadership Presentations and Workshops

Leadership workshops and presentations are available upon request for student leaders and organizations who are interested in a program designed specifically for the needs of their group. Workshops cover a wide variety of topics for any time or place.
