SPD and the Kiwanis Club of Greenville have teamed together to provide mock interviews for ECU students. H.I.R.E.D (Helping Individuals Reach Employment Destinations) was created by SPD in response to the growing request of professors to have their students go through a mock interview as a requirement for their class. SPD realized that the number of students seeking mock interviews would exceed available staff members. The Kiwanis Club of Greenville stepped in to help. Four members, Bill Baker, Bill Barnes, Jean Fox, and Hooker Horton, have volunteered their time this semester to provide half-hour mock interviews to students on Mondays and Fridays at set times during the next 10 weeks. 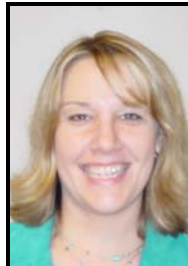
