

GUIDE FOR RELIGIOUS STUDIES MAJORS

Welcome to the Religious Studies Program at East Carolina. There is a growing interest in religion among students across the country, and you are embarking on a program that will provide context and guidance in the study of the fascinating phenomenon of religion. In order to make the administrative and procedural part of your journey as efficient and effortless as possible, please pay careful attention to the following guide. Feel free to contact the advisors or front office staff if you have questions or concerns about your program in general. If you plan to pursue graduate studies or theological (seminary or divinity school) programs, it would be wise to chat with one of us early in your ECU career; we can advise you on how to structure your undergraduate program so that it promotes your long-term goals.

There are three important stages in the successful completion of your program.

I. DECLARING YOUR MAJOR

§ When to Declare: You may declare your major at ANY point, no matter how many or how few credit hours you have completed.

§ Declare your major: See or email Dr. Maher or Dr. Mercer to have your name entered into the computer. Provide the following information: full name, ECU email address (i.e., the one ending with "@ecu.edu"), local mailing address, permanent mailing address, local phone, another major (if you are double majoring), and the primary and the second major (if you are double majoring).

§ Double majors: If you are double majoring, you must identify a primary and a second major. This means six things:

1. Your official advisor, as far as the registrar's office is concerned, is the primary major advisor. If you choose Religious Studies as your primary major, you are still encouraged to seek advice from faculty in your second major. However, your official advisor would be Dr. Maher or Dr. Mercer.
2. Foundations Curriculum credits may be used to satisfy the second major requirements. That is, they may be double-counted for general education and the second major.
3. If any courses are required by both majors, they may be double counted toward both majors.
4. If the primary major is a BS degree, there is no foreign language requirement for the second major, which would be Religious Studies.
5. Your transcript will state the type of degree you have earned ("BA," unless your primary major is BS, in which case it will list "BS") and indicate the primary major discipline. Then, it will indicate "Second Major" and give the discipline of your second major. Your minor, if there is one, will also be indicated. Your religion major will be listed this way on your transcript: "Multidisciplinary Studies: Religious Studies." Your diploma will list the major and the degree ("BA," unless your primary major is BS, in which case it will list "BS"). Your diploma will list only the primary major. It is important to note that for job applications and other career purposes, the transcript is the document usually called for, and it will list both primary and second major disciplines.

Note: Almost all religion students do a double major, with one primary and one second, as described above. If you wish to do a "dual degree," and receive two diplomas, you have to fulfill all the requirements for two majors. If you want more information about this option, see the *Undergraduate Catalog* and your advisor.

§ Advisor: At the time you declare your major, you will be assigned as an advisee of either Dr. Maher or Dr. Mercer. Because registration is increasingly done electronically by each student, it is less significant which advisor you are assigned. You may consult with either of us, or other professors who teach in our program, as questions or concerns arise.

II. REGISTRATION AND COMPLETING YOUR REQUIREMENTS

§ Library resources: Although it is not a separate course requirement, there is a requirement that you must be familiar with research resources in religion, including Joyner Library holdings in religion. During the semester you declare your major, make sure you do the following four things:

1. First, review the research resources provided on the Religious Studies Program website (<http://www.ecu.edu/religionprogram>).
2. *Religion Index One* (Ref BL, 1, R44x), the basic religion index, is found in the reference area. Review this resource in the Joyner Library Reference

area so that you understand how this index can help in writing papers and doing other research.

3. Glance at the various reference books found in the reference area between about BJ and BX.
4. Glance at the religion books in the Joyner Library main stacks; they are mainly located on the second floor between BJ and BX.

§ Course of study: The courses in our curriculum are divided into “Core Religion Electives” and “General Religion Electives.” For the courses in these two categories, see the Program website (www.ecu.edu/religionprogram). Later in this Guide, following the Senior Summary Form, is a checklist; you may find it a useful tool as you plan your course of study. Here is the required curriculum:

Religious Studies Major

Total Hours Required: 120 s.h. (At least 24 s.h. from sections 3 and 4 must be above 2999.)

4. Approved structured electives (can be a major or a minor) to complete required 120 s.h.

Religious Studies Double Major

Students are encouraged to double major in order to broaden their appeal in the marketplace and to complement their primary major. Because of the flexibility of the religion program, it is easy to double major.

Total Hours Required: 120 s.h. (At least 24 s.h. from sections 3 and 4 must be above 2999.)

1. Foundations Curriculum Requirements: 42 s.h.

§ General Education credits may be used to satisfy the 2nd major requirements.

2. Requires 12 s.h. of foreign language through level 1004

§ If religious studies is your second major and your primary major is a BS degree that does not require language, then there is no language requirement.

3. Religion Major Requirements

§ 30 s.h. of Religion courses:

6 s.h.—RELI 4500 & RELI 5000
(Normally taken your last two semesters, in any order)

24 s.h.—Religion courses, with a minimum of 21 s.h. from
“Core Religion Electives”

§ If the primary major is a BS degree, there is no foreign language requirement for the second major, which will be religious studies.

§ If any courses qualify as core or elective courses for both majors, they can be double-counted.

4. Approved structured electives (includes the 2nd major) to complete required 120 s.h.

§ Course schedule/registration: Each semester, as soon as possible and around the time of registration, the courses to be offered in the program will be posted on the religion website (<http://www.ecu.edu/religionprogram>) under the link “Religion Courses Offered Next Semester.” The course list will also be emailed to all students majoring in Religious Studies, and it will be posted on the doors to the offices of Dr. Maher and Dr. Mercer.

Using your PIN and the five-digit registration code, you may register via the web (www.student.ecu.edu) or the telephone (328 2149). Please ask the program staff for the registration code.

If you need to consult with your advisor or get your advisor’s signature on something, please do so as early in the process as possible so we do not find ourselves in a time crunch during the last days of registration. Both advisors have regular office hours, and you are welcome to drop by whenever they are scheduled to be in their offices. However, because of meetings and other

unexpected developments in schedules, it is usually best if you make an appointment.

§ Foundations Curriculum: Focus on completing these requirements early in your college years.

§ Religious Studies requirements: Except for the two RELI senior seminar courses (4500 and 5000), described below, complete your religion course requirements as soon as possible in your program of study. You do not know which courses will be offered in any given term, and you do not want to have your graduation delayed because courses you require are not being taught during your last semester or two.

§ RELI 4500 and RELI 5000: In general you should take these two RELI courses during your last two semesters. RELI 4500 is always offered in the fall, and RELI 5000 is always offered in the spring; you may take them in any order. That is, if you plan to graduate in December, you may take RELI 5000 in the spring and then take RELI 4500 in the fall. In order to register for these courses, you must have the email permission of Dr. Mercer, Dr. Maher, or the course instructor. When you email to request permission, provide your name, social security number, and reason for taking the course (i.e., you are a major, and you are in your last two semesters).

§ Honors: Both for quality of education and recognition, you are encouraged to seek the various honors programs and recognitions. Here are the possibilities:

1. Departmental Honors

Can be awarded for achieving a 3.5 GPA in the 33 s.h. of major courses. Departmental honors appear on the transcript only. This designation is not automatic; if you think you qualify, notify your advisor and ask that the registrar be notified.

2. Foundations Curriculum Honors

Must be in the university Honors Program and maintain a 3.3 GPA on 24 s.h. of honors credit. The designation will appear on the transcript and diploma. Contact the Honors Program for full information.

3. University Honors

Must be in the university Honors Program, maintain a 3.5 GPA on 30 s.h. of honors courses, including a 6 s.h. Senior Honors Project. The designation will appear on the transcript and diploma. Contact the Honors Program for full information.

§ Other Graduation Requirements: Make sure you stay abreast of other requirements for graduation (e.g. WI courses or the foreign language requirement). You are responsible for being aware of and completing all

requirements. Nothing in this Guide can supersede the East Carolina *Undergraduate Catalog*.

III. GRADUATION

§ Senior Summary: (Complete during the first three weeks of the semester prior to the semester you will graduate.)

The Senior Summary is one of the last hurdles all East Carolina students have to jump before getting the degree. Without a properly completed Senior Summary, **your graduation can be delayed**. So, follow the directions carefully. You may find it a bit tedious to complete, but it is important to fill out the forms accurately and carefully. A sample form, completed by a recent graduate, is included at the very end of this Guide. It is provided to give you a paradigm for these pages.

During the first three weeks of the semester prior to the semester you will graduate, complete the Senior Summary Form (attached to the end of this Guide) in the following way. Obtain a print-out of your completed courses from the front office staff. Complete the Senior Summary Form to the best of your ability. An effective procedure is to proceed down your list of courses completed, marking them off as you place them into the proper category on the Senior Summary Form. Be aware that some courses will fit into more than one category, and so you may need to shift the courses around to meet the requirements. For example, PHIL 1690 World Religions can count as Humanities FC credit or Religion Major Core Elective credit, and you may place it into the category where you most need it. If religion is your “primary” major, do not forget to also code a second print-out of your courses, as explained at the end of the Senior Summary Form.

During the first three weeks of the semester prior to the semester you will graduate, you should meet with your advisor (Dr. Maher or Dr. Mercer) in order to review and process your Senior Summary. So, if you are graduating in May, you should meet with your advisor during the first three weeks of the previous fall semester. Contact your advisor several days in advance to set up the appointment. **Bring your COMPLETED hard copy of the Senior Summary Form to the meeting. Prior to the meeting email to your advisor an attachment that contains the COMPLETED electronic version of the Senior Summary Form (this should be identical to the hard copy you bring to the meeting).** If Religious Studies is your primary major in a double major, then you must get your second major advisor to sign the Senior Summary Form that you prepared with your Religious Studies major advisor.

If religion is your second major in a double major, meet with your primary major advisor first. Then, bring to your Religious Studies advisor whatever needs to be signed. Make sure you follow all procedures set forth by your second major department.

§ Application for Graduation: If religion is your second major, follow the instructions of your primary major advisor. If religion is your only or primary major, you should complete the “Application for Graduation” form at the Registrar’s Office no later than two semesters prior to the point at which you will have completed all requirements. Further instructions will be given by the Registrar’s Office. Fill in the following blanks this way:

Major: Multidisciplinary Studies

Concentration: Religious Studies

§ Graduation ceremony. Whether we have a graduation ceremony or not, and the time of that ceremony, depends on the university administration policies for any given year. If Mult does not have a ceremony, mentors are encouraged to include you into their departmental ceremonies, if possible.

In the first month of the semester you intend to graduate, you should consult with us to learn of any plans for a Mult graduation. If Mult does have a graduation, here is some relevant information. Although we all dress up in our academic garb, the Mult graduation is a small and relaxed affair—an opportunity for you to celebrate your significant achievement with friends, family, and teachers. Sometimes we have graduation ceremonies each May for students who anticipate completing their requirements in spring or summer, and in December for students who complete their requirements in fall. Contact program staff to find out if there is sufficient number to have a December ceremony. There will be, of course, a general graduation for all university graduates in December and fall graduates can participate in that. If we do not have a December Program ceremony, December graduates are encouraged to return for the May ceremony, if we have one.

It has been our custom for a professor, with whom you have worked, to have 2-3 minutes to make a few remarks about you. You are responsible for making sure the professor will speak for you and is at the ceremony. By March 1 (for the May ceremony) or October 1 (for the December ceremony) please email to the program staff the following information: (1) the exact spelling of your full name regardless of whether you plan to attend the ceremony, (2) whether or not you plan to attend the ceremony, (3) the name and email address of the professor who will speak on your behalf, and (4) the approximate number of friends and family members you think will attend. If you do not provide the above information by the date indicated, you may participate in the graduation ceremony, but we cannot promise that your name will be on the program nor that you will have a program certificate.

§ Alumni mailing list: Following your graduation, as soon as you know your new address, provide program staff with your email address. Whenever this address changes, please let the staff know. We would like to keep in contact with you. Drop us a note when you can, and let us know what you’re doing.

On the "Major and Electives *Completed*" page and the "Major and Elective *To Be Completed*" page, in the section labeled "Minor, 2nd major, or approved structured electives," just pick out enough courses from all your free electives to put here to add up to 24 s.h.
